RULES

1. The Committee reserves the right to visit competitors' gardens, before or after the Show, to inspect any produce that has been entered (as per Royal Horticultural Society [R.H.S.] Rule 3).
2. NO EXHIBITOR MAY ENTER MORE THAN ONE EXHIBIT IN EACH CLASS - except section H.
3. Entries of Fruit, Vegetables and Flowers must be the exhibitor's own produce and must be entered in the name of the person on whose land such produce has been grown. In all other classes the entry must be the exhibitor's own work.
4. Metric equivalents to Imperial sizes, weights etc are accepted
5. Any Painting, Photograph, Craft item etc. must have signatures or other means of identification effectively covered on the front of the exhibit. (Identification SHOULD be placed on the rear/base of the exhibit if not visible when being Judged to ensure that exhibits can be matched with their exhibit card if separated).
6. Any exhibitor fraudulently infringing these Rules will be disqualified and prizes withheld at the discretion of the Committee. Any dispute arising shall be settled by the Committee and their decision shall be final.
7. Any objection must be given in writing to the Show Secretary one hour before Prize-Giving.
8. The R.H.S **"BANKSIAN MEDAL"** will be awarded to the Competitor with the Highest total of Points in Sections A, B, C and D inclusive. Should two competitors be equal, then the exhibitor with the highest number of 1st places will receive the Medal, unless they have previously won a Banksian Medal and the other not. Competitors can only win this Medal once every three years.
Points Awarded - 1st = 5 / 2nd = 3 / 3rd = 2 / H.C. = 1

9. Where age restrictions apply, qualifying date is 1st September of this year.
10. The decision of the Judges will be final and they are hereby empowered to withhold or diminish the value of any prize if they consider the entries to have insufficient merit.
11. The Committee cannot accept responsibility for loss or damage to exhibits or personal property.
12. ENTRY FEES - Adults Classes 30p per class; Children's Classes 10p per class. Postage stamps will not be accepted as payment for entry fees. Cash must not be sent through Royal Mail. Cash is fine in an envelope through letterbox. Cheques should be made out to "Broadway Show Society"
13. ENTRY FORMS (**BUT NOT EXHIBITS**) must be submitted to the Show Secretary 24 Lime Tree Avenue, Broadway - NO LATER THAN (BUT PREFERABLY EARLIER THAN) 6pm **SATURDAY 5th September 2025**. Unless by prior arrangement with the Secretary (see note [b]). Entry forms can also be submitted via our website
14. **All Exhibits are to be brought to the Show between 6pm and 8pm on Friday 11th September or between 6.30am and 10am on Show Day.** NB: We do not suggest bringing items on the Friday evening which might be damaged by drips or the damp or that are edible unless in jars.
15. Exhibits must have a Class Card (provided upon arrival at the Show) placed name side down with each exhibit and the name of the exhibitor must not be placed uppermost until judging is completed.
16. **The marquee will be cleared by 10.00am** and judging will commence by 10:15 am.
17. PRIZE MONEY will be distributed between 3.30 and 4.15 pm from the Show Table in the Marquee. Unless otherwise stated: 1st Prize: £1:50; 2nd Prize: £1; 3rd Prize: 50p. For Children's / Junior Classes, No's. G13, K7 and L1 to L10, the prize money will be: 1st Prize: £3; 2nd Prize: £2; 3rd Prize: £1. If there is a tie for any prize then the prize money will be split between the winners.
18. **Prize money not collected by 4.30pm will be deemed as having been donated to Show funds.**
19. The award of **Cups, Trophies and the R.H.S "Banksian Medal"** will commence at 4.30pm and will take place outside the Marquee (weather permitting) and visitors will be requested to vacate the Marquees prior to the presentations.
20. **NO EXHIBIT MAY BE REMOVED UNTIL AFTER THE CUP, TROPHY PRESENTATIONS** except by prior arrangement with the Show Secretary. Any items remaining after this time will be disposed of.
21. Winners of the Challenge Trophies are responsible for the Cups/Shields whilst in their possession and they must be returned, in a clean condition, to the Show Secretary at the address below, **AT THE LATEST ONE MONTH PRIOR TO THE SHOW**

ADVICE FOR EXHIBITORS

Below is a list of hints and tips aimed at assisting exhibitors.

If you require further advice regarding staging exhibits or have a question on any Class PLEASE telephone or email the Show Secretary who will endeavour to help.

GENERAL

- Ensure you read the Show Rules and the Specific Section / Class rules before entering an Exhibit.
- Ensure that your Entry Form is clearly marked, that your name and address are legible and that the Form reaches the Secretary on the appointed day or earlier if possible.
- Allow Plenty of time to Stage your Exhibit(s). Marquee emptied at 10.00am for judging.
- Ensure that the Class cards (one per exhibit) are correct and placed with the Exhibit, name side down. (Cards are given out at the entrance to the Marquee).
- Ensure that all sizes, shapes, heights, colours etc that are mentioned in your specific classes are complied with as the Judge will not look at exhibits deemed to be 'Not According to Schedule' (NAS). Pot size is the inside measurement as close to the top as possible.
- Name varieties of fruit, vegetables and flowers where known as Judges may take this into consideration.
- A Vase is a vessel for displaying cut flowers in water. As no vases are provided by the Show Society, this can be any container that fulfils the function of a vase and conforms to the definition previously given. No account should be taken of the container when Judging the material shown in it. (R.H.S. Definition)

FRUIT & VEGETABLE CLASSES

- Fruit should be picked with the stalks attached and grapes should be a complete bunch with a piece of lateral shoot on either side ('T' shape).
- DO NOT polish fruit but leave so that natural bloom is not spoiled.
- Root Vegetables (beetroot, carrots, parsnips) must have leaves cut so that approx 3" of leaf stalk remains, which should be neatly tied.
- Onions - do not over skin, should have the tops tied with uncoloured raffia and roots neatly trimmed back to the basal plate
- Cucumbers should be matched and of a good, fresh green colour. Flower should be completely developed but it is not necessary that the flowers remain attached.
- Shallots - roots should be cut off to the basal plate and the tops neatly tied or whipped with uncoloured raffia. Stage on dry sand or similar material on a plate or plant saucer.
- Squash - stalk should be retained.
- All exhibits in a class should be the same variety or cultivar unless otherwise stated.

FLOWERS

- Remove any damaged flowers together with discoloured or broken leaves
- Cut a portion from the stem to assist water uptake ensuring that the length of stem is proportionate for the vase or container.
- Name flower / plant variety on a card (write these out at home to save time when staging).

SHOW DAY

When staging exhibits ~ if you experience problems or need advice then please speak to a Steward or the Show Secretary who will assist. Please DO NOT move or rearrange other exhibitors' exhibits, wait for the Secretary or Steward who will make space available.

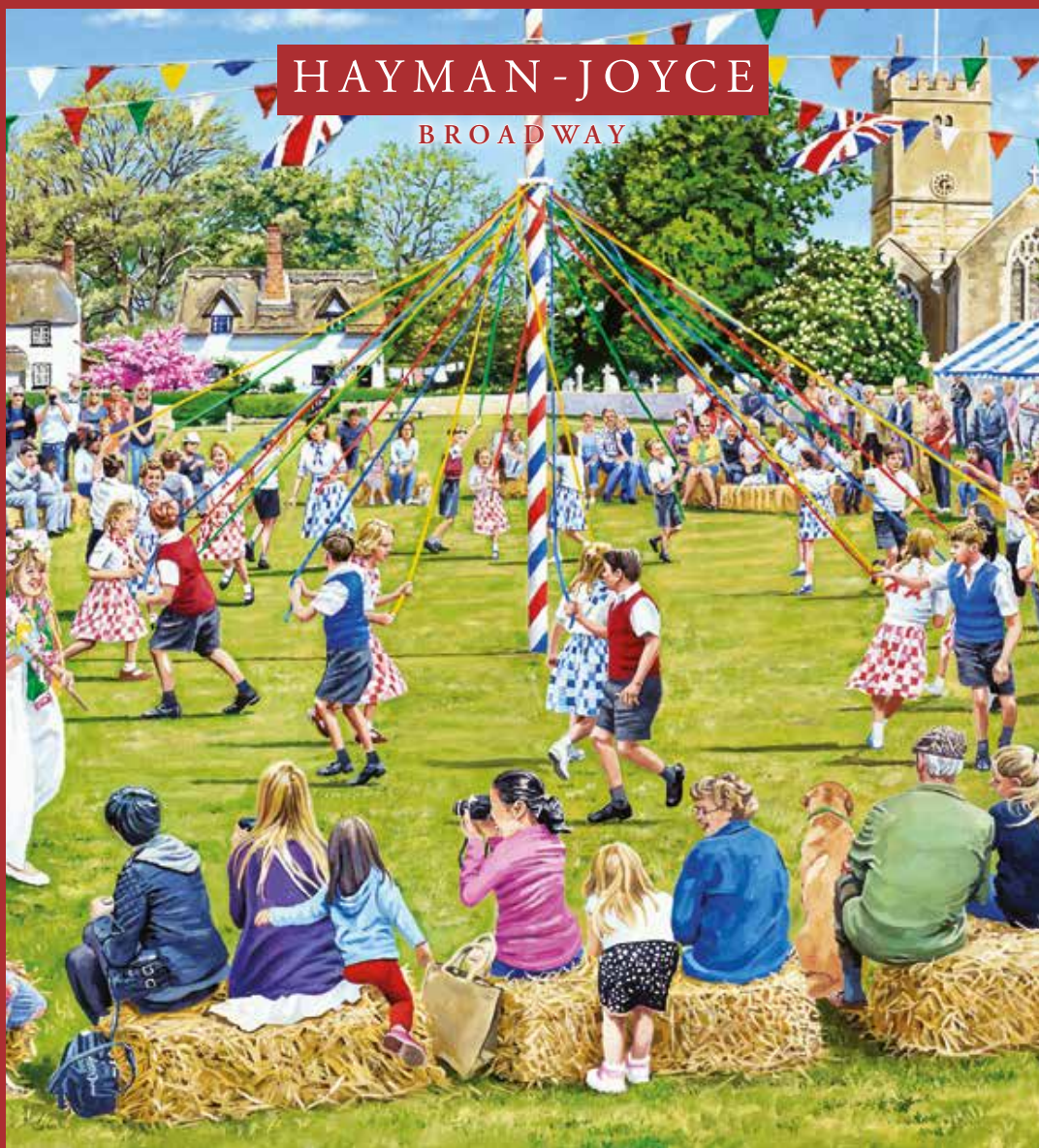

A sample of all materials provided must be used. Entry for this class will be £5 however you will also receive a free glass of prosecco to get the creative juices flowing!

- NB:** (a) *All Preserves must be in clear, unmarked glass jars, unmarked lids and labelled.*

Mary Berry’s Coffee and Walnut Cake

For the cake - Ingredients:

225g/8oz unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for greasing
225g/8oz caster sugar
4 large free-range eggs
225g/8oz self-raising flour
½ level tsp baking powder
1 tbsp coffee granules, dissolved in 1 tablespoon of boiling water
50g/1¾oz walnuts, finely chopped

Cake Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas
4. Lightly butter two deep loose-bottomed 20cm/8in round tins and line the bases with baking paper.
2. Put the butter, sugar, eggs, flour, baking powder and coffee in a large mixing bowl and beat together (using an electric hand

or about ¼ tsp food colouring paste

2 large free-range eggs

8 white chocolate truffle balls, to decorate

For the filling and topping:

125g/4½oz unsalted butter, softened

225g/8oz icing sugar, sifted

1 tbsp coffee granules, dissolved in 1 tablespoon of boiling water, left to cool

8 walnut halves, to decorate

whisk if you have one) until well combined and smooth. Fold in the walnuts.

3. Divide the mixture evenly between the tins. Level the surface using a spatula or the back of a spoon.

4. Bake for 25–28 minutes, or until an inserted skewer comes out clean. Leave the cakes to cool in the tins for 5 minutes,

then run a small palette knife or rounded butter knife around the edge of the tins and carefully turn the cakes out onto a wire rack. Peel off the paper and leave to cool completely.

5. For the filling and topping, beat the butter until very soft and pale. Gradually add the icing sugar, mixing well between each

addition. Add the cold coffee and beat until smooth.

6. Choose the cake with the best top, then put the other cake upside-down onto a serving plate and spread with half the coffee icing. Sandwich together with the other half. Ice the top of the cake and decorate with the walnut pieces to serve.

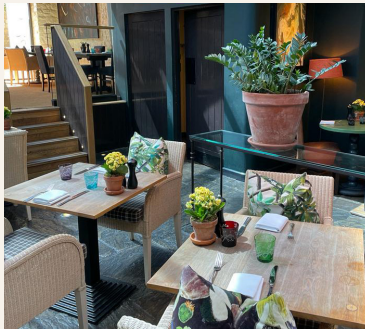
